Why is Community Communication so Important?

- Schools are not islands separate from the community
- When something goes wrong you have built up some trust
- It is a role of the board
- Have to realize that how people get and process information is completely different then it was not that long ago

Why is Community Communication so Important?

- Your community will form opinions and get information about education and your schools even if you do not send anything out
- They may even gather get misinformation
- Someone will be shaping your communities opinions shouldn't it be you!
- Inaction is not an Option

Look at Yourself Through the Community's Eyes

- Don't underestimate the importance of body language
- When public comes to a board meeting be aware you are being observed – maybe even filmed
- Don't look at your cell phone, look at the people who are speaking
- Explain the process explain it again
- Leadership is always being observed

The Four Functions of a Board of a Education

- 1. Provide guidance through policy. (Policy)
- Provide for a program of quality instruction to advance student achievement. (Planning)
- Provide for the effective management of the district by employing and evaluating the chief school administrator (CSA). (Appraisal)
- Provide for two-way communication between the community and board. (Communication)


It is All About Relationships



A few lines to use to diffuse confrontation...


- "We understand people have very different opinions about this topic.
 We are committed to hearing all points of view, then to make the best decisions we can in interest of the students."
- "We may not all agree on this topic, but we must show each other respect when sharing opinions."
- "The Board's primary goal is serving the best interests of our students.
 When making our decisions, we take all public comments into consideration, keeping in mind we must and will follow all State regulations."

When members of the public demand a response...

- "Public comment is a time Board members carefully listen to opinions and concerns so they can make the best decisions possible. However, 'public comment' is not 'public discussion' - we will not be engaging in discussion at this time."
- "Please contact the Superintendent's Office directly with your question. Proper information will be gathered and as appropriate, the Board President or Superintendent will respond to your question in a timely manner."
